


Together, We Can Do Better

The AWP Network Overview

The AWP Network is the connective tissue between local community resources and national programs. The program is staffed by a dedicated team of case coordinators with social services backgrounds who are experts at holistically identifying problems and finding one-size-fits-one solutions on behalf of veterans, their families, and caregivers. Transportation, short-term financial assistance, housing, and assistance with VA claims are some of the most pressing needs that community-based programs need help addressing.





The AWP Model in Action

In April of 2023 a post-Vietnam Army veteran reached out to a community branch of AWP. He lost his job of nine years when the company had to close its doors, and his unemployment benefits were coming to an end. His wife had recently left him, he had no money for his mental health medication and reported various plans he had to take his life. "One for every day of the week," he told his case coordinator.

The warrior was connected to the 988 crisis line, his local VSO for assistance with his disability claim, and Veterans Affairs to assess his medical and mental health. During his appointment with the VA, this warrior was admitted for emergency mental health assistance. The only person he called was his case coordinator at AWP stating, "I want you to know I am okay, and I didn't want you to worry." This is a true testament to the power of building relationships with warriors and providing effective resource connection.


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About America's Warrior Partnership
